Robert Thomas Mitchell was born in North Bay, Ontario in 1930 to a Welsh tenor and a Canadian concert pianist. His father emigrated to Canada in the early 1920s. Unable to find a Plymouth Brethren congregation in the area, he joined the Baptist church and was a faithful member until he met Robert's mother.

She was the daughter of his manager, and he quickly formed a bond with her, even though she had been severely handicapped in a tragic accident as a child. Their mutual love of music and devotion to Jesus Christ resulted in their marriage, and Robert's father took catechism in the Catholic church.

Their home was a place where their six children lovingly entered into daily worship, prayer, and music. At an early age Bob felt the call to join a religious order, and he entered the Congregation of the Resurrection in

London, Ontario while he attended University. In his third year, his father

suffered a
severe stroke
leaving the
family without a
bread winner.
Bob left the
order, returning
home to provide
for his parents
and younger
brothers and



sisters. During these twenty years he taught high school and worked with mentally and physically handicapped children. For two years he taught at the University of Toronto training teachers to work with special needs students.

When his parents died, he was faced with a decision—live alone and continue working as a teacher, or return to a religious order. After much prayer and reflection, he was led to the Franciscan order in Lumsden, Saskatchewan where he completed his novitiate. He took further training at Newman Theological College in Edmonton where he received his Master's of Theology degree. In 1975 he was ordained as a priest in the Catholic church.

In 1972 he began his work as a Spiritual Director. In that role he has mentored hundreds of seekers from all walks of life and theological persuasions. Director and Directee meet around scripture and prayer to discern God's direction for their lives.

Thirty years ago, Father Bob was sent to the Mount St. Francis Retreat



Centre in Cochrane, where he has actively preached, performed the sacraments, led retreats, and written six books of poetry and reflection. Even in his nineties, he continues his work as a Spiritual Director, meeting with twenty-two different Directees each month.

In 2023, Father Bob discerned that his Lenten devotions should focus on the ministry of Jesus in Holy Land as recorded in the first three gospels. Each day he would reflect on a passage, asking, "Lord, what would you have me learn from this?" His thoughts and insights were recorded in his spiritual journal which forms the basis of this devotional.

This devotional is meant to supplement the daily videos which feature scenes from the Holy Land, the poetry of Father Bob, scripture, reflection and a discussion of the question for the day. In November 2023, Father Bob fell down the stairs and broke his neck. As he convalesces, his mobility is limited, however, he continues to be involved with the project through the readings.

Spiritual Direction Tuesday, February 13, 2024

Show me your ways, LORD, teach me your paths.

⁵ Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long. (Ps. 25:4,5)



The quality of a tour is dependent upon the knowledge and skill of the guide. When going on a spiritual journey, it is important to understand who is leading and what will be expected of us along the way.

Father Bob sought the

Lord in prayer before choosing the direction of his Lenten experience.

Much as he guides his spiritual directees to discern God's will through the use of scripture, prayer and quiet reflection, he engaged in his own discernment. By placing himself in the footsteps of Jesus, he was able to gain new insight into familiar scriptures that provoked questions, challenged presuppositions, and confirmed his faith.

"Of all persons who ever walked this earth Jesus was the most free. His freedom poured forth from him because he was rooted in love and compassion. He was so free he was able to heal lepers, to speak the truth against injustice, to cause havoc in the Temple, to save an adulteress from being stoned and to speak about the kingdom with authority. We recognize his freedom and know he was free because he was deeply rooted in the love of God. Because of his love and freedom he was also humble. He was so free and humble he could die as a criminal on the cross. And in Jesus' freedom, God's freedom of love was revealed." (Father Bob, "Freedom")

February 14 – Ash Wednesday Bethlehem – Day 1 of Lent

Place: Bethlehem
Action: Jesus is born
Scripture: Luke 2:11-12:

"Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. And here is a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."



Insight: I adore, praise, glorify God who today took on our humanity so that through his suffering love he could redeem and save us. The simplicity and poverty of his birth spoke into my heart and he said to me, "Live in like manner."

Action: Magi adore Jesus Scripture: Matthew 2:1-12






Friday, February 16th Nazareth – Day 3 of Lent



Place: Nazareth Action: Jesus returns after a time in Egypt Scripture: Matthew 2:13-15; 19-23

The angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you, and escape into Egypt, and

stay there until I tell you, because Herod intends to search for the child and do away with him'. So Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, left that night for Egypt, where he stayed until Herod was dead. This was to fulfil what the Lord had spoken through the prophet: I called my son out of Egypt.



After Herod's death, the angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you and go back to the land of Israel, for those who wanted to kill the child are deadSo Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, went back to the land of Israel. But when he learnt that Archelaus had succeeded his father Herod as ruler of Judaea he was afraid to go there and being warned in a dream he left for the region of Galilee. There he settled in a town called Nazareth. In this way the words spoken through the prophets were to be fulfilled: 'He will be called a Nazarene.'

Insight: Joseph was obedient to the voice of God and it saved Jesus' life. In the same way, Jesus's obedience to his parents spoke to me. For thirty years he was subject to Mary and Joseph. I must examine my own life of obedience and ask for forgiveness for times I was not obedient.

The Word Made Flesh - By Father Bob

Saturday, February 17 Jordan River – Day 4 of Lent

Place: Jordan River

Action: Jesus is baptized by John the Baptist

Scripture: Matthew 3:13-17

Then Jesus appeared: he came from Galilee to the Jordan to be baptised by John. John tried to dissuade him. 'It is I who need baptism from you' he said 'and yet you come to me!'

But Jesus replied, 'Leave it like this for the time being; it is fitting that we should, in this way, do all that righteousness demands'. At this, John gave in to him. As soon as Jesus was baptised he came up from the water, and suddenly the heavens

opened and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming down on him. And a voice spoke from heaven, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on him'.




Insight: What moves us in regard to this scene is the great humility of Jesus. He had no need to be baptized because he was sinless but he wanted to be an example for others and so in absolute humility he came to John and was baptized there by him. John preached the requirements of the messianic kingdom. Don't be afraid of the truth, even though the truth may

lead to your death. How deep are your convictions? In our lives we are more prone to pride than to imitate this marvelous humility of Jesus. What Jesus reveals in his humility is true freedom.

Insight: Jesus also calls each person to leave all and to follow him, to live in his Word, to witness to his presence and teachings. To follow him, in fact, is the sweet path to salvation. Often we stumble and fall only to be picked up and restored by God's grace. How thankful are we for his call to us? We were not created for slavery but to be the lords of creation.

Tuesday, February 20th Galilee – Day 6 of Lent

Place: The whole of Galilee

Action: Jesus preaches and Heals **Scripture:** Matthew 4:13, 23-25

Leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the

kingdom and curing all kinds of

diseases and sickness among the people. His fame spread throughout Syria, and those who were suffering from diseases and painful

complaints of one kind or another, the possessed, epileptics, the paralysed, were all brought to him, and he cured them. Large crowds followed him, coming from Galilee, the Decapolis, Jerusalem, Judaea and (Perea).



Insight: Through his loving and encouraging preaching, Jesus touches our hearts and enables us to be free in him. We feel his presence when we read his words which inspire us to be good. Only his love then can satisfy us. How we long for this.

- 5:12 Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven; this is how they persecuted the

Thursday, February 22 Feeding of 5,000 – Day 8 of Lent

Place: A deserted place in Galilee

Action: Feeding the 5000 Scripture: Luke 9:12-17

When evening was approaching, the Twelve came to Jesus and said, "Send the people away now so that they can go to the villages and farms in the area and obtain food and lodging, for we are in a deserted place."

He replied, "Give them something to eat yourselves." They said, "All we have are five loaves and two fish—unless we go and buy food for all these people." For there were present about five thousand men.

Then he instructed his disciples, "Make them sit down in groups of about fifty." They did so and made them sit down. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and blessed and broke them and gave them to the disciples to distribute among the people. They all ate and were satisfied. Then they gathered up what was left over—twelve baskets of fragments.

Insight: Wherever Jesus went he was followed by a crowd who wanted to see him and listen to his gracious words. On this occasion he was



surrounded by thousands of people, many of them had travelled many miles to be near him. Jesus was conscious of their tiredness and hunger and worried some of them would collapse on their return home. What is revealed here--the great love and compassion of God toward people even in their physical needs. Most importantly it is the prefiguring of the Eucharistic miracle which nourishes millions of people around the world every day in this great Sacrament of Love.

Friday – February 23nd Plains of Galilee – Day 9 of Lent

Place: Synagogue Action: Jesus teaching Scripture: Matthew 7:15-20

'Beware of false prophets who come to you disguised as sheep but underneath are ravenous wolves. You will be able to tell them by their fruits. Can people pick grapes from thorns, or figs from thistles? In the same way, a sound tree produces good fruit but a rotten tree bad fruit. A sound tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor a rotten tree bear good fruit. Any tree that does not produce good fruit is cut down and thrown on the fire. I repeat, you will be able to tell them by their fruits.

Insight: Here Jesus is pointing to us that we must be good in order to have any influence on others and the world. He uses the example of a tree bearing fruit. A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears rotten fruit. What kind of fruit do I bear? How do I reveal my influence on others by living God's commandments.

Saturday, February 24th Galilee – Day 10 of Lent



Place: Galilee

Action: Healing the leper Scripture: Matthew 8:1-4

After he had come down from the mountain large crowds followed him. A leper now came up and bowed low in front of him. 'Sir,' he said 'if you want to, you can cure me.'

Jesus stretched out his hand, touched him and said, 'Of course I want to! Be cured!' And his leprosy was cured at once. Then

Jesus said to him, 'Mind you do not tell anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest and make the offering prescribed by Moses, as evidence for them'.

"Jesus and the Leper" - By Father Bob

Rejected! Dejected! Lonely! Afraid!

Rejected by society.

He came— Humbly, Simply, Hopefully.

Insight: Recognizing our own leprosy and our need of the loving forgiveness of God. Do we ever come humbly and kneel before Jesus and ask for healing and forgiveness? Am I a sinner ready to acknowledge this need? We cry out to be free.

Sunday – February 25th Teaching on the Meaning of the Sabbath

Place: Cornfield

Action: Picking corn on Sabbath **Scripture:** Matthew 12:1-8

At that time Jesus took a walk one sabbath day through the cornfields. His disciples were hungry and began to pick ears of corn and eat them. The Pharisees noticed it and said to him, 'Look, your disciples are doing something that is forbidden on the sabbath'. But he said to them, 'Have you not read what David did when he and his followers were hungry —how he went into the house of God and how they ate the loaves of offering which neither he nor his followers were allowed to eat, but which were for the priests alone?

Or again, have you not read in the Law that on the sabbath day the Temple priests break the sabbath without being blamed for it? Now here, I tell you, is something greater than the Temple. And if you had

understood the meaning of the words: What I want is mercy, not sacrifice, you would not have condemned the blameless. For the Son of Man is master of the sabbath.'

Insight: The Pharisees criticize the disciples of Jesus for breaking the Law of Sabbath and Jesus responds to them by declaring that the Son of Man is the Master of the Sabbath. Do we observe the Sabbath properly by doing only what is necessary on Sunday?



"Our God" - By Father Bob

Jesus revealed God, His Father, As a loving, compassionate, forgiving God; Not a God of anger, Not as a judge.

God never spies on us, Never pounces upon us, Ready to punish. He simply loves us. God gave us a law To establish a healthy direction. It is a loving law Set to heal and abolish fear.

Jesus gave us the true picture, The true face of God, The God of Love, Truth and Light, Intensely concerned with each of us.

Jesus' Father is the God, Who is in love with each one, Regardless of our lowly status. He is the God of Life.

Monday, February 26th Synagogue in Galilee – Day 11 of Lent



Place: The Synagogue Action: Healing a man with a withered hand Scripture: Matthew


12:9-14

He moved on from there and went to their synagogue, and a man was there at the time who had a withered hand. They asked him, 'Is it against the law to cure a man on the sabbath day?' hoping for something to use against him. But he said to them,

'If any one of you here had only one sheep and it fell down a hole on the sabbath day, would he not get hold of it and lift it out? Now a man is far more important than a sheep, so it follows that it is permitted to do good on the sabbath day.

'Then he said to the man, 'Stretch out your hand'. He stretched it out and his hand was better, as sound as the other one. At this the Pharisees went out and began to plot against him, discussing how to destroy him.

Insight: Jesus is pointing out the hypocrisy of the Jewish leaders and reminisces of the loving acts they should be performing instead of criticizing. Do we ever wrongfully judge others or refuse to come to the aid of the sick and poor?

Tuesday, February 27 Nazareth – Day 12 of Lent



Place: Nazareth
Action: Jesus rebuffed in his hometown
Scripture: Matthew
13:34-38; 54-58

In all this Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed, he would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy: I will speak to you in parables and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Coming to his hometown, he taught the people in their synagogue in such a way that they were astonished and said, 'Where did the man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers? This is the carpenter's son, surely? Is not his mother the woman called Mary, and his brothers James and Joseph and Simon and Jude? His sisters, too, are they not all here with us?

So where did the man get it all?' And they would not accept him. But Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country and in his own house', and he did not work many miracles there because of their lack of faith.

Insight: Jesus returns to his own town and taught the people in the synagogue. Familiarity closed their minds to what he was saying. They were astonished at his words but said, "Surely this is Mary's Son." Do we ever allow familiarity to cloud our vision and hearing so that one cannot grow spiritually?

Wednesday – February 28th Shores of Galilee – Day 13 of Lent



Place: In a boat by the shores of Galilee Action: Parable of the Sower Scripture: Matthew 13:1-9: 18-23

That same day Jesus went out

of the house and sat by the lake. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat in it, while all the people stood on the shore. Then he told them many things in parables, saying:

"A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. Whoever has ears, let them hear.

Therefore listen to the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what has been sown in his heart; that is the seed sown on the path. As for the seed sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy. But such a person has no deep root, and he endures for only a short time. When some trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, he immediately falls away. "The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word, but worldly cares and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit.

However, the seed sown in rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it; he indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirty times what was sown."

Insight: Sacred Scripture reminds us: The whole earth is full of God's knowledge. The whole earth is full of God's wisdom. The whole earth is full of God's goodness. Each bit of creation is an unique revelation that

holds us spellbound filling us with wonder and delight. We need to be converted to see it, to make connections.

The men were astounded and said, 'Whatever kind of man is this? Even the winds and the sea obey him.'

Insight: Jesus speaks to us of our response to fear. The story asks us to look at the area of trust in our lives, especially trust in God. When the going gets tough to whom do we turn? Are we like the apostles or do we turn to Christ our Saviour. He can calm even the most disturbing of our interior life. Jesus says trust in me. Do we?

They came to land in the country of the Gerasenes which is opposite Galilee. He was stepping ashore when a man from the town who was possessed by devils came towards him; for a long time the man had worn no clothes, nor did he live in a house, but in the tombs.

Catching sight of Jesus he gave a shout, fell at his feet and cried out at the top of his voice, 'What do you want with me, Jesus, son of the Most High God? I implore you,


For Jesus had been telling the unclean spirit to come out of the man. It was a devil that had seized on him a great many times, and then they used to secure him with chains and fetters to restrain him, but he would always break the fastenings, and the devil would drive him out into the wilds.

'What is your name?' Jesus asked. 'Legion' he said-because many devils had gone into him. And these pleaded with him not to order them to depart into the Abyss.

Now there was a large herd of pigs feeding there on the mountain, and the devils pleaded with him to let them go into these. So he gave them leave. The devils came out of the man and went into the pigs, and the herd charged down the cliff into the lake and were drowned.

When the swineherds saw what had happened they ran off and told their story in the town and in the country round about; and the people went out to see what had happened. When they came to Jesus they found the man from whom the devils had gone out sitting at the feet of Jesus. clothed and in his full senses; and they were afraid.

Those who had witnessed it told them how the man who had been possessed came to be healed. The entire population of the Gerasene territory was in a state of panic and asked Jesus to leave them. So he got into the boat and went back.



Insight: Jesus drives the demons out of a possessed man. His very words were enough to set the man free from bondage. We are not likely ever to be an exorcist but we all have the power to pray over someone who appears to needs

deliverance. A group of people praying in the Spirit can break the bonds of possession. In some ways we all need deliverance.



Insight: In today's world and culture we very much need to ask ourselves, "Who is Jesus Christ?" What kind of relationship do we have with him? Do we allow his words and practices to enter fully into our lives? Do his miracles astonish us? Do we allow his love to penetrate us and change us? Do we really love him or is it only a charade?

It was at Caesarea Philipi that Peter first confessed that Jesus was the Messiah before he was taken up with Jesus, James and John to the Mt. of Transfiguration. It is also where Jesus met him after the resurrection and called him to feed his sheep.

There in their presence he was transfigured: his face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.'

He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him.' When they heard this the disciples fell on their faces overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' Insight: We all desire to stand in the great glory of God. Jesus took his three disciples up a high mountain and there he revealed his divinity in a glorious blaze of light. Do you ever imagine what that must have been like? Can you picture yourself with Peter, James and John experiencing this Theophany?

When he had come to the end of all he wanted the people to hear, he went into Capernaum. A centurion there had a servant, a favourite of his, who was sick and near death. Having heard about Jesus he sent some Jewish elders to him to ask him to come and heal his servant.

When they came to Jesus they

pleaded earnestly with him. 'He deserves this of you' they said 'because he is friendly towards our people; in fact, he is the one who built the synagogue.'



So Jesus went with them, and was not very far from the house when the centurion sent word to him by some friends: 'Sir,' he said 'do not put yourself to trouble; because I am not worthy to have you under my roof; and for this same reason I did

not presume to come to you myself; but give the word and let my servant be cured. For I am under authority myself, and have soldiers under me; and I say to one man: Go, and he goes; to another: Come here, and he comes; to my servant: Do this, and he does it.'

When Jesus heard these words he was astonished at him and, turning round, said to the crowd following him, 'I tell you, not even in Israel have I found faith like this'.

And when the messengers got back to the house they found the servant in perfect health.

Insight: Here we have an example of the effectiveness of the prayer of petition. A centurion trusted Jesus even though he was an unbeliever. His prayer was answered. He had asked that his servant be healed, not asking anything for himself. Healing follows on the heels of faith. Do we trust thus?

"Waiting in Prayer" - By Father Bob

Insight: Outside Nain Jesus comes upon a funeral procession. It is for the only son of a widow. Jesus not only sees her grief but also her situation – no one to care for her. Jesus raises the son to life and gives him back to his mother. How do we reset in such a situation? How gracious and supportive are we?

"Death" - By Father Bob

Thursday – March 7th Tyre – Day 20 of Lent


Place: Near Tyre Action: Healing for all Scripture: Mark 7:24-30

A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving

him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him and passed by on the other side.

But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have."

Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands` hands?'

'The one who took pity on him' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself'.

Insight: A Samaritan fulfilled the law of compassion and love by stopping to give to a young man who had fallen afoul of thieves. The young man would most likely have died without the ministrations of the Samaritan. Who are we like? Do we resemble the priest, the Levite, or the Samaritan? When is the last time you came to the aid of someone in distress?

"Unconditional Servant" – By Father Bob

Naked, bruised, bleeding, abandoned, All his possessions stolen, The young man unconscious lay In the sand, in the ditch.

All his plans so carefully prepared For nought, or so it seemed. How gaily he had set out upon This new adventure scheme. Youthful, anxious, ambitious, His years not yet Laden with wisdom deep He set out joyfully.

Suspecting nothing in his naivete, He joined a group of men Appearing so friendly indeed His heart was warmed.

Desolate part of the road attained His friends, so called, Abused him surely, cruelly. Taking all he had.

His life they spared unknowingly. Adventure seemed so dim As in his state so sad He bled, colouring the sand.

Now as the time drew near for him to be taken up to heaven, he



resolutely took the road for Jerusalem and sent messengers ahead of him. These set out, and they went into a Samaritan village to make preparations for him, but the people would not receive him because he was making for Jerusalem. Seeing this, the disciples James and John said, 'Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to burn them up?' But he turned and rebuked them, and they went off to another village.

Wednesday – March 13th Synagogue – Day 25 of Lent

Place: Synagogue in Perea Action: Healing – Do we believe?

Scripture: Luke 13:10-13

One sabbath day he was teaching in one of the synagogues, and a woman was there who for eighteen years had been possessed by a spirit that left her enfeebled; she was bent double and quite unable to stand upright. When Jesus saw her he called her over and said, 'Woman, you are rid of your infirmity' and he laid his hands on her. And at once she straightened up, and she glorified God.



insight: How eager are we to join our neighbours from all over seeking healing from Jesus. Do we trust that he will be willing? Listen and reflect on this story and know when we come in faith something always happens; but we must believe in faith and trust. Do we?

Place: Village on way to Jerusalem Action: Blessing children Scripture: Matthew 19:13-15

People brought little children to him, for him to lay his hands on them and say a prayer. The disciples

turned them away,but Jesus said, 'Let the little children alone, and do not stop them coming to me; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs'.

Childlikeness: Jesus said, "unless you become like one of these little ones you cannot enter the kingdom." (Luke 18:15-17) What did he mean by the words become like a little child? He meant our willingness to accept oneself as being of little account; to be regarded as unimportant. Jesus uses the child as an image of the kingdom. A child is a symbol of those in lowest places in society. These are: the poor oppressed, beggars, prostitutes, marginalized. They are the little ones of society in the eyes of Jesus. So often in our world they are dispersed and ignored. They are filled with feelings of shame and inferiority. Jesus acknowledges them as important to him. In compassion we too must see these little ones as having great value as Jesus did. He allotted them a privileged place in his kingdom. How do we see these people?

"Jesus Speaks" - By Father Bob

insight: The trust and simplicity of children drew from Jesus his loving response. He prayed with them and blessed them and told the disciples not to send them away. What does this say to us? In imitating Jesus we foster the proper growth of the little ones, protecting them from abuse and above all to respect their dignity.

Friday – March 15th Jericho to Jerusalem – 27th Day of Lent

Scripture:
Matthew 20:29-34

As they left Jericho a large

crowd followed him. Now there were two blind men sitting at the side of the road. When they heard that it was Jesus who was passing by, they shouted, 'Lord! Have pity on us, Son of David.'

And the crowd scolded them and told them to keep quiet, but they only shouted more loudly, 'Lord! Have pity on us, Son of David.'

Jesus stopped, called them over and said, 'What do you want me to do for you?'

They said to him, 'Lord, let us have our sight back'. Jesus felt pity for

them and touched their eyes, and immediately their sight returned and they followed him.

Insight: Once again we see the compassionate mercy of Jesus as he responds to their plea to be cured. In our day many of us are blind and do not recognize the fact. Perhaps our blindness is the lack of faith, or we are so caught up in worldly affairs we fail to see the Godgiven realities all around us. What do I intend to do—cry out

to the Lord.

The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get."



The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner".

Insight: This little parable speaks eloquently to today's culture.

God calls us to simplicity of heart. This means living humbly and in poverty of spirit. Which of the two men do

we most resemble? Be honest.

The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

Insight: The Pharisees wanted to disconcert Jesus but could not. A lawyer asked him a question and Jesus gave him the perfect answer which he was not able to dispute. He gave the ruling process for our living. How do we handle difficult questions, especially when asked by people who desire to distress us or to put us down?

A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man". And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place.

No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher". In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Insight: Here Jesus is pointing out to us the proper way to choose a place at table. It is a lesson in humility. We choose the lowest place and the host may summon us and move us higher. Humility is the truth about who we are. Choose wisely.

This was a supreme and eternal generosity. How do we see this giving reflected in our daily lives? Are we willing to make sacrifices so that we can be generous?

Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, when a woman came to him with an alabaster jar of the most expensive ointment, and poured it on his head as he was at table. When they saw this, the disciples were indignant;

'Why this waste?' they said. 'This could have been sold at a high price and the money given to the poor.'

Jesus noticed this. 'Why are you upsetting the woman?' he said to them. 'What she has done for me is one of the good works indeed! You have the poor with you always, but you will not always have me.

When she poured this ointment on my body, she did it to prepare me for burial. I tell you solemnly, wherever in all the world this Good News is proclaimed, what she has done will be told also, in remembrance of her.'

Insight: The disciples criticize the action and the generosity of this woman. It is because they fail to understand the true meaning of poverty. When we fail to understand, it is easy to judge the actions and words of other. What is your reaction to this story? Would you act differently today? How do we regard poverty in light of the Gospel?

something he might say and so enable them to hand him over to the jurisdiction and authority of the governor.

They put to him this question, 'Master, we know that you say and teach what is right; you favour no one, but teach the way of God in all honesty. Is it permissible for us to pay taxes to Caesar or not?'

But he was aware of their cunning and said, 'Show me a denarius. Whose head and name are on it?' 'Caesar's' they said. 'Well then,' he said to them 'give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar-and to God what belongs to God.'

As a result, they were unable to find fault with anything he had to say in public; his answer took them by surprise and they were silenced.

Insight: The agents posed the question. Jesus answered masterfully. When we are asked such a question what kind of answer do we give. Would we be aware of the trap within the question itself? The agents were defeated.

Place: Hill overlooking Jerusalem

Action: Jesus prepares his disciples for his death

Scripture: Matthew 20:17-21

As Jesus was going up to Jerusalem, he took the twelve disciples aside by themselves and said to them, "Behold, we are now going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn him to death. Then they will hand him over to the Gentiles to be mocked and scourged and crucified, and on the third day he will be raised to life."

Insight: Of all persons who ever walked this earth, Jesus was the most free. His freedom poured forth from him because he was rooted in love and compassion. He was so free he was able to heal lepers, to speak

the truth against injustice, to cause havoc in the Temple, to save an adulteress from being stoned and to speak about the kingdom with authority. We recognize his freedom and knew he was free because he was deeply rooted in the love of God. Because of his love and freedom he was also humble. He was so free and humble he could die as a criminal on the cross. And in Jesus' freedom, God's freedom of love was revealed.

"Obedience" – By Father Bob

We are dead to the Law of Old So that we can live for God. We die with Christ in obedience



Palm Sunday: Father, thank you for Jesus our King. Thank you for sending Jesus to be our PEACE. Prepare our hearts this week to SEE Him and KNOW Him greater. Let us see the great cost of our salvation. Thank you for knowing our greatest need and providing the only solution to that need.

Monday Cleansed: Pray like this: Father, we ask for you to forgive us of our sin. We confess of any known sin and ask you to reveal any unconfessed sin in our lives. We thank you that your Son was offered as a sacrifice for this sin that we confess.. And that by His blood we can find forgiveness. As we draw nearer to celebrating the empty tomb, Father, may we approach it with clean hands and pure hearts. Search our hearts and know them, Lord.

Tuesday Questioned: Father, thank you for the Lamb. Thank you for the Lamb that was without spot or blemish. Thank you that He who knew

no sin, became sin, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him. Your word says, "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins." Let us remember that is is for OUR sin that the Lamb was slain.

Wednesday Patient: Father, thank you for your Word. Thank you that you are patient with me and my "not-getting it". Continue to transform my heart, mind, and life. I yield to your conforming me into the image of your Son. Your kindness is meant to lead to repentance. So today I repent of my slowness to get it and trust in You.

Thursday Remember: Father, thank You for the body that was given and the blood that was shed. Thank you for your servant, Jesus, who loved us until the end. We know that nothing can separate us from your love that we find in Christ Jesus. As we prepare to take of Communion tomorrow, may we remember the blood and the body of our Lord. Holy Spirit, open our eyes to see, ears to hear, and hearts to feel.

Friday Crucified: Father, thank You for the cross. Thank you for the perfect Lamb of God. We remember today, the pain and suffering of the cross, and all that Jesus was willing to endure, so we could be set free. He paid the price, such a great sacrifice, to offer us the gift of eternal life. Help us never to take for granted this huge gift of love on our behalf. Help us to be reminded of the cost of it all. Forgive us for being too busy, or distracted by other things, for not fully recognizing what you freely given, what you have done for us. Thank you Lord that by your wounds we are healed. Thank you that because of your huge sacrifice we can live free. Thank you that sin and death have been conquered and that your Power is everlasting.

Saturday Wait Lord, waiting is hard. We as humans struggle not being in control or even knowing what is going on. Teach us to wait. Teach us to be still. Teach us to trust you. We thank you that the story doesn't end here.

Sunday – March 24th Palm Sunday

Place: Jerusalem

Action: The Real Trimphal Entry Into Jerusalem

Scripture: Matthew 21:11

When they drew near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent off two disciples, saying to them, "Go to the village directly ahead of you, and as soon as you enter you will find a tethered donkey and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, tell them, 'The Lord needs them.' Then he will let you have them at once." This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the prophet:

"Say to the daughter of Zion: 'Behold, your king is coming to you, humble and riding on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.' "

The disciples went off and did as Jesus had instructed them. They brought the donkey and the colt, and laid their cloaks on their backs, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that preceded him and those that followed kept shouting:

Hosanna to the Son of David!



Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!"

Insight: The kings and potentates arrive at the gates of Jerusalem in all their rich splendour, sitting on a festooned elephant or camel. They come in pride and power. The people are forced to gather and cry out a welcome most do not mean. The whole thing is a spectacle. It is not a real triumphant entrance, but a sham.

The very real triumphant entry into Jerusalem is when Jesus enters. He does not come in pride and power fastened in glittering jewels with trumpets blaring. On the contrary, he comes with the followers of love and humility. His mount is a lowly colt. He sits astride it; his legs hanging down in reverential silence. He is in a contemplative stance because he knows all that is to follow. But the people gather to greet him along the way with the sung and shouted alleluias, waving their palm branches in salutation. No trumpets blasts are heard. Some of the people even throw their robes on the road in front of Jesus and the colt. Such an entry is real because it portrays the very reality of God's poverty and humility and compassionate love.

Monday – March 25th Cleansing the Temple – Day 35



Place: Temple in Jerusalem Action: Cleansing the Temple from moneychangers

Scripture: Matthew 21:12-

17

And Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who sold and bought in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the moneychangers and the seats of those who sold pigeons. He said to them, "It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer,' but you make it a den of robbers."

And the blind and the lame came to him in the temple,

and he healed them. But when the chief priests and the scribes saw the wonderful things that he did, and the children crying out in the temple, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" they were indignant, and they said to him, "Do you hear what these are saying?" And Jesus said to them, "Yes; have you never read,

"'Out of the mouth of infants and nursing babies you have prepared praise'?"

And leaving them, he went out of the city to Bethany and lodged there.

Insight: (Taken from a Lenten message delivered by Pope Francis-March 8, 2015)

"Does the Lord feel at home in my life? Do we allow Him to 'cleanse' our hearts and to drive out the idols, those attitudes of cupidity, jealousy, worldliness, envy, hatred, those habits of gossiping and tearing down others?"

"Jesus cleanses with tenderness, with mercy, with love. Mercy is His way of cleansing. Let us, each of us, let us allow the Lord to enter with

His mercy – not with the whip, no, with His mercy – to cleanse our hearts. The whip of Jesus with us is His mercy. Let us open to Him the gates so that He would make us a little cleaner."

"Let us build for God a temple of our lives. If we are witnesses of this living Christ, so many people will encounter Jesus in us, in our witness."

"His body, destroyed on the Cross by the violence of sin, will become in the Resurrection the universal meeting place between God and men. His humanity is the true temple where God is revealed, speaks, is encountered. Let us allow Him to enter into our lives, into our families, into our hearts."

"Father Forgive Them" – By Father Bob

Action: Jesus is Betrayed

Scripture: Luke 22; Matthew 26, 27

Luke 22:1-6 - The Plot

Now the Festival of Unleavened Bread, called the Passover, was approaching, and the chief priests and the teachers of the law were looking for some way to get rid of Jesus, for they were afraid of the people. Then Satan entered Judas, called Iscariot, one of the Twelve. And Judas went to the chief priests and the officers of the temple guard and discussed with them how he might betray Jesus. They were delighted and agreed to give him money. He consented, and watched for an opportunity to hand Jesus over to them when no crowd was present.

Matthew 26:17-25 - The Betrayal

When evening came, Jesus was reclining at the table with the Twelve. And while they were eating, he said, "Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me." They were very sad and began to say to him one after the other, "Surely you don't mean me, Lord?"

Jesus replied, "The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me. The Son of Man will go just as it is written about him. But woe to that man who betrays the Son of Man! It would be better for him if he had not been born.

"Then Judas, the one who would betray him, said, "Surely you don't mean me, Rabbi?"

Jesus answered, "You have said so."

While he was still speaking a crowd came up, and the man who was called Judas, one of the Twelve, was leading them. He approached Jesus to kiss him, but Jesus asked him, "Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss?"

Then Jesus said to the chief priests, the officers of the temple guard, and the elders, who had come for him, "Am I leading a rebellion, that you have come with swords and clubs? Every day I was with you in the temple courts, and you did not lay a hand on me. But this is your hour—when darkness reigns."

Matthew 27:1-10 - The Final Solution

When Judas, who had betrayed him, saw that Jesus was condemned, he was seized with remorse and returned the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders. "I have sinned," he said, "for I have betrayed innocent blood."

"What is that to us?" they replied. "That's your responsibility." So Judas threw the money into the temple and left. Then he went away and hanged himself. The chief priests picked up the coins and said, "It is against the law to put this into the treasury, since it is blood money." So they

decided to use the money to buy the potter's field as a burial place for foreigners. That is why it has been called the Field of Blood to this day.

\ Wednesday – March 27th The Last Supper – Day 37 of Lent

Luke 22; Matthew 27; John 13 -Then came the day of Unleavened Bread on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and make preparations for us to eat the Passover."

"Where do you want us to prepare for it?" they asked.

He replied, "As you enter the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him to the house that he enters, and say to the owner of the house, 'The Teacher asks: Where is the guest room, where I may eat the

Passover with my disciples?' He will show you a large room upstairs, all furnished. Make preparations there."

They left and found things just as Jesus had told them. So they prepared the Passover. When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it

among you. For I tell vou I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it. and gave it to them. saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same



way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you."

John 13 – Jesus Washes the Disciples' Feet



Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

Jesus replied, "You do not realize now what I am doing, but later you will understand."

"No," said Peter, "you shall never wash my feet."
Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me."

When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you. Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him.

Thursday – March 28th The Trial – Day 38 of Lent

Luke 22, Matthew 26 The Garden of Gethsemane

Then Jesus went with his disciples to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to them, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee along with him, and he began to be sorrowful and troubled. ³⁸ Then he said to them, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me."

Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."



Then he returned to his disciples and found them sleeping. "Couldn't you men keep watch with me for one hour?" he asked Peter. "Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak."

He went away a second time and prayed, "My Father, if it is not possible for this cup to be taken away unless I drink it, may your will be done."

When he came back, he again found them sleeping, because their eyes were heavy. So he left them and went away once more and prayed the third time, saying the same thing.

Then he returned to the disciples and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and resting? Look, the hour has come, and the Son of Man is delivered into the hands of sinners. Rise! Let us go! Here comes my betrayer!"





Then seizing him, they led him away and took him into the house of the high priest. Peter followed at a distance. And when some there had kindled a fire in the middle of the courtyard and had sat down together, Peter sat down with them.

A servant girl saw him seated there in the firelight. She looked closely at him and said, "This man was with him."

But he denied it. "Woman, I don't know him," he said.

A little later someone else saw him and said, "You also are one of them." "Man, I am not!" Peter replied.

About an hour later another asserted, "Certainly this fellow was with him, for he is a Galilean."

Peter replied, "Man, I don't know what you're talking about!" Just as he was speaking, the rooster crowed. The Lord turned and looked straight at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him: "Before the rooster crows today, you will disown me three times." And he went outside and wept bitterly.

Jesus' Trial

At daybreak the council of the elders of the people, both the chief priests and the teachers of the law, met together, and Jesus was led before them. "If you are the Messiah," they said, "tell us." Jesus answered, "If I tell you, you will not believe me, ⁶⁸ and if I asked you, you would not answer. ⁶⁹ But from now on, the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the mighty God."

⁷⁰ They all asked, "Are you then the Son of God?" He replied, "You say that I am."

⁷¹ Then they said, "Why do we need any more testimony? We have heard it from his own lips."

Friday – March 29th The Death of Jesus – Day 39 of Lent

Luke 23; Matthew 27

Meanwhile Jesus stood before the governor, and the governor asked him, "Are you the king of the Jews?"

"You have said so," Jesus replied.

Then Pilate asked him, "Don't you hear the testimony they are bringing against you?" But Jesus made no reply, not even to a single charge—to the great



amazement of the governor.

Now it was the governor's custom at the festival to release a prisoner chosen by the crowd. At that time they had a well-known prisoner whose name was Barabbas. So when the crowd had gathered, Pilate asked them, "Which one do you want me to release to you: Barabbas, or Jesus who is called the Messiah?"

While Pilate was sitting on the judge's seat, his wife sent him this message: "Don't have anything to do with that innocent man, for I have suffered a great deal today in a dream because of him."

But the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus executed. "Which of the two do you want me to release to you?" asked the governor.

"Barabbas," they answered. "What shall I do, then, with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" Pilate asked. They all answered, "Crucify him!"

Then he released Barabbas to them. But he had Jesus flogged, and handed him over to be crucified.


